Week starting: June 8, 2009

1. Reasons to be cheerful?

This week's lesson features contrasting feelings of optimism and pessimism in the face of current economic, political, social, and environmental issues.

Level

Upper intermediate and above (equivalent to CEF level B2 and above).

How to use the lesson

1. Would your students generally describe themselves as optimistic, pessimistic, or something in between? Ask them how optimistic/pessimistic they are with regard to national/global economic, political, social, and environmental issues in their countries, and why.
2. Tell students they are going to read the opinions of three people about how optimistic/pessimistic they are. Give your students five to ten minutes to read through Worksheet A, encouraging them to look up new vocabulary. You could ask them to check if any of their ideas are mentioned. Tell them they are going to answer a series of questions on the text, but that they shouldn't write anything down at this stage.
3. Divide the students into pairs and hand out Worksheet B. Ask them to work together to complete the different types of comprehension questions in Exercises 1, 2, and 3.
4. Check answers in open class.
5. Ask the students if they particularly agree or disagree with any of the opinions expressed on Worksheet A, and if so, why.
6. Hand out Worksheet C and ask the students to work together to complete the crossword.
7. Check answers in open class.
